
Mr. Fujita's Scrapbook




Hawthorne Works plant of Western Electric. Cicero, IL. These employees planned their 5th annual picnic for July 1915.



EASTLAND DISASTER

No. 749. (Polish.) Husband, 25; wife, 25; daughter, 1; infant son. Insurance, \$1,000. Husband and wife were drowned together. The hus-

band had been an employe of the Western Electric Company at a salary of \$13 a week. An aunt was made guardian of the children, and one was placed with each of two married brothers of the husband. The life insurance money was placed in probate and the gift money placed in trust, to be paid \$12.50 a month to each

brother for the care of the children. Emergency relief and benefit by the Western Electric

Company, \$448. Eastland Fund gift, \$2,675.

(Loss of Brother or Sister)

No. 52. (German.) Brother, 25; sister, 25; sister, 20; niece, 11. Real estate, \$5,000; insurance, \$210; mortgage, \$2,200. A single man, employed by the Western Electric Com-





THE EASTLAND DISASTER

WHILE STILL PARTIALLY TIED TO ITS DOCK AT THE RIVER'S EDGE, THE EXCURSION STEAMER EASTLAND ROLLED OVER ON THE MORNING OF JULY 24, 1915. THE RESULT WAS ONE OF THE WORST MARITIME DISASTERS IN AMERICAN HISTORY. MORE THAN EIGHT HUNDRED PEOPLE LOST THEIR LIVES WITHIN A FEW FEET OF THE SHORE. THE EASTLAND WAS FILLED TO OVERFLOWING WITH PICNIC-BOUND WESTERN ELECTRIC COMPANY EMPLOYEES AND THEIR FAMILIES WHEN THE TRAGEDY OCCURRED. INVESTIGATIONS FOLLOWING THE DISASTER RAISED QUESTIONS ABOUT THE SHIP'S SEAWORTHINESS AND INSPECTION OF GREAT LAKES STEAMERS IN GENERAL.
